Light in the Dark

Travel all over the world has been hard lately for everyone. I really miss getting to see the people of Haiti, and all of our girls and staff frequently. But that is what makes getting to go back even more special right now! In March, I was able to visit Haiti for a week and it was so good to be back! We have been working really hard to keep the house at full operation during these tough times, and I am happy to report that everything is safe and sound inside the walls of House of Hope.

I'm sure that most of you, if not all, have heard by now that Jovenel Moise, President of Haiti, was assassinated in his home on July 7th. Tension has been high as the people don't know what the next day could bring. We ask that you continue to keep Haiti and House of Hope in your prayers. We are grateful to those that have been asking how they can help. There's no simple solution that any of us can provide. We know that the work at House of Hope will keep marching on to ensure that the girls, staff, and neighbors receive tools and resources they need to grow, thrive, and succeed despite the obstacles that continue to be thrown in their path.

We are confident that Haiti will rise. The resiliency of her people is unmatched.

Unfortunately, the tension and uncertainty did result in closing school for the remainder of the year. Eduar will be reaching out and recruiting people to teach the girls some skills to keep their hands and brains busy. They will have the opportunity to bake, sew, and make jewelry. We are proud of the family atmosphere that has grown even deeper, despite all of the hardship they've endured over the last few years.

Youth group is continuing to gather weekly. Their love of worship and fellowship is such a bright spot in the community. I have been working with Eduar to help him create sermon plans and write sermons. I had the privilege of preaching while visiting in March, and on a day where some tragic violence had occurred throughout the country, I witnessed 80 Haitians, with their eyes closed and hands raised, worshipping with a hope that is found in Christ. The youth that I have had the privilege of interacting with give me a lot of hope for the future of Haiti.

As always, thank you so much for all the love and support we receive. Our work and the spread of the Gospel in our little corner of Haiti is made possible because of your faith in Christ and support of His work! Thank you!
